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How you can help patients across the Hospital



Every year we aim to raise at least £1million to enhance care for patients across all wards and departments at the Hospital and support the NHS staff who care for them.

One of the projects we're currently fundraising for is the provision of 20 specialist cots for newborn babies on the Labour and Postnatal wards. The state-of-the-art cots, which cost £1,900 each, will benefit the 2,200 babies born at the Hospital each year and their mums.



Maternity Matron Becky Roberts says: "The cots are height adjustable and have drop down sides which make it much easier and more comfortable for mums to be closer to their babies, enabling greater bonding in the first few hours of life. The new cots will enhance not only the experience of babies who are in our care, but also their parents."

If you can donate or raise £1,900 or more you will have the opportunity to add your name, or that of a loved one, to your very own cot.

We're also fundraising for a range of other projects which your support could help to fund including:

- A mechanical chest compression system for the Emergency Department (£15,000).
- A dedicated room in the Gynaecology Department for women to receive treatment after sadly experiencing a miscarriage early in their pregnancy (£65,000).
- An audiometer, which will provide the latest technology for hearing assessments and enable hearing aids to be tested and programmed remotely so patients have to travel to hospital less (£12.000).
- Helping create a new Day Surgery Unit discharge lounge and waiting area to enhance the comfort of those who have undergone surgery (£92,000).

Stars Appeal Ambassadors host MRI Scanning Suite Private View

Frontline staff who volunteer as Stars Appeal Ambassadors hosted a special 'private view' event in October to show donors and fundraisers, who helped fund the second MRI scanner and MRI scanning suite, the difference that their support is making.

The £1.7million scanning suite and second MRI scanner funded by your donations have already helped over 15,000 local people.

MRI scans are used to diagnose cancer, strokes, heart problems, spinal and brain injuries and many other conditions. Having a second MRI scanner means the Hospital is able to scan around 30 patients every day, which helps to reduce waiting times and means patients have to travel less to other hospitals. It has

enabled an additional 4,200 patients a year to receive scans. And the Suite, which opened in 2021, provides a spacious and relaxing environment for patients as well as enhanced facilities for staff.

Mr Graham Branagan, Consultant Surgeon and Lead Clinical Ambassador, who hosted the event, says: "Thousands of people have already benefited from these facilities and tens of thousands more will over the years to come. All of us involved in the Stars Appeal are immensely proud of the Hospital and the enhancements we can provide through our charity. It is a privilege to be able to show supporters the impact of their generosity first-hand."

The second MRI scanner has also enabled the Hospital to introduce new scanning techniques such as MRI scans of the heart.

Consultant Cardiologist and Stars Appeal Ambassador, Dr Tom Jackson, says: "We can look at the heart from any angle and get the best possible images. It is a massive boost for patients to be able to have this done locally."

Alongside the second MRI scanner, the two Stars Appeal funded CT scanners continue to provide patients with over 27,000 CT scans a year.

Meet David, just one of the people your donations help



56-year-old David Kunzer lives in Salisbury with his wife Sarah. He has four children and is a chartered accountant. David is just one of the thousands of local people that benefit from projects funded by your donations and fundraising. Here he shares his story of how the Stars Appeal made a difference to him and his family during his treatment at Salisbury District Hospital.

"In March this year, I was about to start a new job, so I went for a routine health check with my doctor. My GP wanted to do further tests and referred me for a colonoscopy. On May 5th, I had the colonoscopy at the Hospital in the morning. The team called me back immediately and, at 3pm that day, I had a full body CT scan

The next week, I went with Sarah, my wife, for an appointment with Rob Padwick, the Colorectal Surgeon, to discuss my results. Mr Padwick explained that it was not good news and that he had found a tumour on the left hand side of my large bowel. He confirmed that it was bowel cancer.

As you can imagine, at this point, my world started to fall apart...

The following Wednesday I had an operation to remove the tumour, which, thankfully, was successful and the cancer was contained. Five days later, I returned home. I am now continuing with my ongoing recovery. "As you can imagine, at this point, my world started to fall apart..."

I would like to thank Rob Padwick, his colorectal team, the nurses and staff at the Hospital for the exceptional care and support that I received. I am eternally grateful.

I also want to thank the Stars Appeal. If it wasn't for the Stars Appeal funding an extra CT scanner, I would not have received a full body scan on the same day as my colonoscopy examination. Whilst recovering in Chilmark Ward at the Hospital, I also benefited from the free Wi-Fi, paid for by the Stars Appeal, and received cups of tea from the Stars Appeal tea trolley. I also enjoyed the tranquillity of the charity's gardens during my stay, spending much time there with my family.

My final thanks goes to everyone reading this that supports the Stars Appeal, for the difference that you have made to my life and my family's life. I ask that you carry on supporting the Stars Appeal, and the valuable work that the charity performs."

Your support is making great things happen at your hospital



Here are just a few examples of the equipment and projects that support like yours has funded over the last 12 months.

Refurbishment of the Medical Engineering Department

The Medical Engineering
Department, which provides
bespoke mobility and
rehabilitation aids for adults
and children with complex
disabilities, has been given a
fresh new look. As part of this
£41,000 refurbishment, the
waiting areas and clinical rooms
have been enhanced with
sensory lighting and equipment
and colourful and inviting
artworks, making it a more
calming and comfortable space
for patients to receive treatment.



New plastic surgery theatre

This £190,000 dedicated plastic surgery theatre with state-of-the-art equipment enables patients to be treated as day cases rather than having to spend several nights in hospital.



Salisbury Hospital's first 3D ultrasound machine

The 3D ultrasound machine in the Gynaecology Unit provides the best possible images to help diagnose a range of conditions and pick up complications in early pregnancy. The £90,000 machine reduces the need for patients to have to undergo other types of scans or invasive procedures.



Accommodation for parents

Your support provides free accommodation and home comforts for families whose babies and children are being treated on the Neonatal Unit and Children's Ward.

Virtual reality therapy headset

Children on Sarum Children's Unit can be transported into space or go on a dinosaur safari thanks to this virtual reality headset. The specialist therapy kit, costing £6,000, helps children to feel calmer, distracts them from treatment and makes their time in hospital more fun.



Phone charging stations

Staying connected with loved ones while in hospital has been made easier thanks to new charging stations where patients and visitors can charge their mobile phones and other electronic devices for free. Two charging stations are located in the Accident and Emergency Department, and we are trialling another in other areas of the Hospital.



Baby brain monitor

This specialist £21,000 monitor can quickly detect if a baby is having a seizure especially in cases where there are no physical signs.

Stars Appeal Live and Engagers

Every week Stars Appeal Live musicians bring music and entertainment to patients in hospital. And our Stars Appeal Engagers programme provides companionship and social activities for older and long-stay patients.



Cancer support projects

Patients with cancer have access to a range of Stars Appeal funded support projects. These include aromatherapy, headwear for patients who lose their hair, hot drinks and snacks for chemotherapy and oncology outpatients and dedicated swimming sessions in the Hospital pool.



Benson Suite marks 10 years of supporting bereaved families

For over 10 years, the Stars Appeal Benson Suite has been supporting bereaved parents who tragically experience the loss of their baby.

The Suite, which opened in 2013, provides a dedicated, private space where bereaved families who lose a baby shortly before or after birth can spend time with their babies and grieve away from the Labour Ward.

Your donations enable us to fund a specialist bereavement midwife who cares for families before, during, and after their time on the Suite. We are also able to maintain and enhance the Benson Suite environment, provide equipment, visits from Hospital chaplains, keepsakes for families, and support the Wave of Light event at Salisbury Cathedral, which brings families together to mark Baby Loss Awareness Week.

Tamar Vellacott and her partner Cameron Pratt from Salisbury were supported at the Benson Suite after the loss of their baby son Albie in February 2022. Tamar says: "The use of the Benson Suite meant the world to us as we were able to celebrate and grieve the birth and loss of our baby away from the Labour Ward where new parents were having the best day of their life as we battled through our worst.

"The privacy and dignity that the Benson Suite offers is second to none. For a place where so many hearts have broken, we walked out of there feeling supported, loved and that our baby had been born and died surrounded by so many people who cared which is all you could ever want.

"I am so grateful to have been given the time we needed to prepare ourselves to say goodbye."

'Thank you for helping me to walk again'



After a "life-changing" horse riding accident 35-year-old Megan Field was left paralysed and told she would never walk again.

The accident in May 2023 damaged Megan's spinal cord, causing paralysis of her lower legs. She says: "It was like a light going out where the connection to that part of my body just went. I thought I can't feel my legs or anything below the chest, nothing."

After surgery Megan, who is from Trowbridge, started to get feeling back in one of her legs and was later transferred to Salisbury Hospital's Duke of Cornwall Spinal Treatment Centre to start her rehabilitation treatment. She was one of the first patients to use the £29,000 Stars Appeal-funded LiteGait – a supported mobile hoist system that enabled her to practice and build up her strength and confidence walking with and without crutches.

Four months after her accident she was able to walk out of the Spinal Treatment Centre with the help of her crutches and is continuing her recovery at home.

"This has been such a life-changing injury, which happened within a split second. I woke up in the morning able to walk and went to bed that night paralysed. You rely on equipment like the LiteGait and the physios to help you with your rehab. As a result of that I'm starting to walk again. When I first had my injury I was told I would never walk again.

"The progress I've made would have taken much longer without the LiteGait. It's made a huge difference to me. Every day on the Spinal Unit Stars Appeal equipment made a difference to my life. It is massively important and supports everything the therapists are doing. I don't really have the words to say what this has meant to me. Thank you to all the Stars Appeal supporters who have made this equipment possible and helped me to walk again."

Megan's physiotherapist Elly Marchant said: "The LiteGait is something we've wanted for a long time because we know how empowering it can be for patients. It is a great addition to our tools that we can

use to start people's walking in a safe environment. This would not have been possible without the generous supporters of the Stars Appeal. Thank you."

During her time in the Spinal Centre, Megan also benefited from the Stars Appeal Wi-Fi as well as other equipment and facilities funded by the charity, including specialist trainer bikes and the Stars Appeal anti-gravity treadmill, adjustable dining tables and the Silver Lounge, which provides a quiet space and also a place to socialise.

She says: "The free Wi-Fi was a real lifeline as the minimum stay in the Spinal Unit is 12 weeks, so being able to access the internet for free means we are able to keep in touch with the outside world. I used the Silver Room regularly when I wanted a quiet break from the ward environment and to socialise with other patients in the evening where we would watch films."

New arrivals on Labour Ward

Expectant mums now have access to the very latest baby monitoring equipment on the **Labour Ward at Salisbury District Hospital.**

Your generous donations have funded eight stateof-the-art Cardiotocography (CTG) machines which monitor the hearts of babies before and during labour, helping midwives and doctors monitor the health of the baby, as well as monitoring the mum's contractions. The new machines cost £80,000 in total.

CTGs are used particularly for pregnant mums with high risk factors and enable midwives to detect any problems. Several of the new monitors have wireless sensors so expectant mums have more freedom to walk around.

Midwife Tori Harper says: "It is one of the best tools we've got to help us to understand in a snapshot how the baby is doing. Having these new CTGs is enhancing the care for babies and mums by significantly improving the quality of our monitoring."

First-time mum Michaela Cone, from Amesbury, benefited from a Stars Appeal CTG monitor during the birth of her son Rory. She says: "Having the latest monitors to see how your baby is doing and hearing their heartbeat while you're waiting for your labour to progress has been really reassuring. The machine is fantastic and helped put my mind at ease. I want to say a big thank you to Stars Appeal supporters for making this equipment possible."
