But it is now running at £1.25million full capacity. This means more and more people are having to travel to 0)-£1million other hospitals for their MRI scan or use a mobile scanner in the hospital car park. £900,000 £750,000 £600,000 £500,000 We already have an amazing £500,000 towards our target thanks to generous donations from the Salisbury Independent Hospital Trust and another local trust who wish to remain anonymous. We can't thank these generous donors enough for kick-starting our campaign for the second MRI scanner.

What will the benefits be?

1. Local care for local people

No need to travel to other hospitals for your scan.

2. The most advanced diagnostic tests

The very latest technology will allow the introduction of cutting edge diagnostic techniques including cardiac and prostate MRI.

3. Waiting times cut

Medical staff will be able to:

- Diagnose conditions more quickly, which helps save lives
- Treat patients more quickly
- Get results faster, reducing anxiety for patients and their families
- · Get patients home from hospital sooner

Who will benefit?

- · Eye conditions
- · Chronic back pain, sciatica, slipped discs

- Patients from Wiltshire, Hampshire and Dorset

Salisbury's first Breast Unit opens

Thanks to your amazing donations and fundraising, Salisbury District Hospital's first ever dedicated Breast Unit officially opened in April, and it's already helped thousands of local people.



The new £1million Unit provides the best possible facilities and a supportive, private and dignified environment for breast patients. Dedicated diagnostic, treatment and counselling rooms enable the hospital's breast team to deliver even quicker and better care to around 4,500 local patients each year. Diagnosis and follow up can now be offered in one place with no need for patients to visit other departments in the hospital. And thanks to the increased space, and availability of dedicated state-of-the-art equipment, patients attending for tests to see if they have breast cancer receive their diagnosis on the same day, avoiding anxious waits for results.


The Unit is named after retired Salisbury engineer David Brown who made a particularly substantial donation to the campaign. Many other generous donors have also been recognised within the Unit through the naming of rooms and on a huge plaque within the main waiting area.

"At the age of 26 I heard the words 'unfortunately it's cancer'. I walked through a packed waiting room, into the corridor and tried to find my way to radiology. I had no choice but to cry in the waiting room. This dedicated new unit has changed all that. It provides a more comfortable and private space. It negates the need to move from department to department, constantly explaining who you are and why you are there. It's somewhere where patients do not need to keep undressing. It makes the whole journey smoother and quicker for those requiring tests, those newly diagnosed and those like myself that are still being monitored. The new breast care unit provides an area for patients and their families to come to terms with their diagnosis and on behalf of all the patients, I would like to thank Stars Appeal supporters for their wonderful support."

Supporting patients across Salisbury District Hospital

As well as major campaigns like the MRI scanner and Breast Unit, your donations enable the Stars Appeal to fund ongoing projects across the hospital benefitting thousands of local people each year, helping them to get better faster, return home sooner and have a more positive hospital experience. We aim to raise £1million each year to fund projects like these and many others. Here are a few examples.

Hospital Chaplaincy

Hospital chaplains play a vital role, from supporting seriously ill and end-of-life patients and their families, to arranging funerals, weddings and supporting staff through the most challenging times. Stars Appeal funding helps ensure they can 'be there' for local people of all faiths and none, every day of the year.

What patients say: "I've been on the Burns Unit for six months after an accident at home. I don't get many visitors but the chaplains are always there for you. They are very caring and encouraging... it's aided my recovery."



Free Wi-FI



Free Stars Appeal Wi-Fi is available across the hospital, helping patients stay in touch with family and friends, access free entertainment and keep up with their lives from their hospital bed.

What patients say: "I have recently been in hospital for serious surgery and the internet access provided during my many stays helped enormously to keep me connected to the outside world. A big thank you to the Stars Appeal x"

Older people and dementia care

Providing entertainment, interactive creative activities and social and psychological support through our Engage and Elevate programmes and other initiatives to help fight isolation, depression, anxiety and loneliness.

What patients say: "It has really lifted my wife's spirits, and mine too."



Benson Suite

A place where families who experience the tragic death of a baby at birth can be treated in a private, dignified space and given the time they need to say goodbye. Your donations ensure these families get all the support they need and that the Suite continues to be a warm and welcoming safe haven.

What families say: "Our baby daughter was delivered sleeping on the Benson Suite. We got to spend very precious hours with her. If it wasn't for the Stars Appeal we wouldn't have got this time together. We will be forever grateful."



Parents' accommodation

Our parents' accommodation on the Neonatal Unit and Children's Ward offers free 'home away from home' accommodation to families while their child is in hospital. Keeping families together at this critical time ultimately helps speed up the child's recovery.

What families say: "Being able to stay only metres away from my twin boys made the whole experience of having premature babies bearable. It would have broken my heart to leave them."



New buildings and extra equipment

Each year, donations and legacies enable us to create new or enhanced buildings and fund state-of-the-art equipment across many areas of the hospital's work. For example the new Eye Clinic, advanced jaundice testing equipment for babies and a 3D head scanner.





Spinal Unit Recreation Service

Days out, social activities and practical rehabilitation, like going to the shops, make a huge difference for patients spending months in hospital trying to come to terms with life-changing injuries and permanent paralysis.

What patients say: "After my motorbike accident, I was very apprehensive about being in a wheelchair. But these trips break down the walls, make it not so impossible and help you realise you can do it."



Community support

We get such great support from local people each year!

We are grateful to everyone that supports us, and although we don't have enough space to mention you all, here are a few examples:

- 26 Engineer Regiment raised £1,250 for the **Children's Ward** from the 'Exercise Sapper Peloton' cycling challenge.
