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Lily-Eva's letter

Nine-year-old Lily-Eva Cole, from Salisbury, was cared for on Sarum Children's Ward after being diagnosed with kidney cancer.

Lily-Eva sadly passed away in August 2025. Her family have kindly allowed us to share a letter Lily-Eva wrote to our President Lord Pembroke about what the Stars Appeal meant to her during her time in hospital. Her words are a beautiful reminder of the difference your support can make to young patients and their families.

"Dear Lord Pembroke

My name is Lily-Eva. I am looked after by Salisbury Hospital as I was diagnosed with cancer on my 9th birthday in September 2024. I was excited to hear that you are coming to the ward today. I have to stay protected from viruses but I'd like to tell you about some of the amazing things we do here so I hope you will read my letter.

Thanks to Stars Appeal there is a very special play team here who help keep me busy and distracted from all my treatment. I haven't been able to go to school or see my friends since I was diagnosed with cancer, so the play team are very special to me. They keep me company and always make me smile. They are like my friends.

Some of my favourite things to do with them are:

★ Making slime - they don't care if it gets messy hehehe.

- ★ Making loom band bracelets to give to my doctors and nurses. Also, for my family and friends to keep us close when we can't see each other.
- ★ Singing and dancing with me.

One of my favourite memories with them is when they took me for a walk with my mum to the secret garden – shhh don't tell anyone. They got very wet whilst I was warm and dry in my wheelchair. They didn't mind though, they always say I am the most important person so if I'm ok it doesn't matter.

There are so many things that Stars Appeal have done for me and my family. They look after me, my mum, my dad and my brother. They give us toys and games to play with and they always talk to us if we are feeling scared or sad.

Last summer I did the Walk for Wards with my family. I knew it was important to raise money for the charity, but I didn't think it would be me needing help from the Stars Appeal. Stars Appeal is very special and the work you do to help children like me is very important.

Celebrating our record-breaking 20th Walk for Wards

Our fantastic community made our 20th Walk for Wards a day to remember – raising a recordbreaking £166,946!

Over 2,100 walkers registered to take part in our annual sponsored walk on Sunday 6th July, at Wilton House. Participants walked 3k, 5k,10k or the new 15k route to thank the hospital for the care they or their family have received, with some dedicating their walk in memory of a friend, parent, sibling or child. There was also live entertainment from local musicians for walkers to enjoy whilst picnicking on the lawns.

Lorna and Sam Foster walked the 5k route with their children Emilia, five, and Josh, three, who has haemophilia, a rare blood disorder, and is cared for on the Children's Ward.

Lorna said: "The play assistant, the sensory room and the beds for parents provided by the Stars Appeal have been a godsend. The first major bleed Josh had the play assistant stayed with us to help calm him down so he could get his treatment. It's fantastic to be able to give back to the hospital and the Stars Appeal who have been such a support to us."

Marie Gower, who has been undergoing treatment for breast cancer, completed the 10k route with her husband Trevor.

She said: "The Stars Appeal really has made the most amazing difference not just to me, but also my husband. The charity provides funding within the Pembroke Suite which has helped me in so many ways, from the aromatherapy to the hot drinks and snacks whilst undergoing treatment each week, which are fantastic.

"At my first chemotherapy treatment I was terrified. The whole of the Pembroke Suite staff were amazing and kind, but I still couldn't stop crying. It was towards the end of my first treatment that I met the wonderful Stars Appeal Aromatherapist. The aromatherapy really made me feel pampered and me again at a time when I was feeling anything but me."

Chair of the Stars Appeal Ambassadors and Consultant Surgeon Graham Branagan said: "This record-breaking total is a testament to the incredible support and generosity of our local community. The money raised helps us provide the very best care for thousands of patients and their families across the hospital."

The event was held by kind permission of Stars Appeal President Lord Pembroke and Lady Pembroke, sponsored by Salisbury Reds, with support from Wilton and Salisbury Rotary Clubs who marshalled the event, and many other local people and organisations.

Since its launch in 2006, Walk for Wards has raised over £1.5million, which has helped fund projects including the hospital's first dedicated Breast Unit, a new Children's Unit, Cardiac Suite and family accommodation on the Neonatal Unit, as well as state-of-the-art equipment such as additional MRI and CT scanners.

New lung function machine helping 2,000 patients each year

A state-of-the-art lung function machine funded by generous support like yours is saving local people undergoing treatment for respiratory illness, cancer and other conditions from having to travel to far away hospitals for treatment.

The £74,000 machine is used to treat patients in the Respiratory Department with Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), asthma, pulmonary fibrosis, cancer and heart conditions and monitors how well their lungs are working. Around 2,000 patients use this equipment a year with 3,500 tests performed.

The new machine means patients can have their tests at Salisbury Hospital instead of travelling to other hospitals further away and can be seen more quickly. The equipment has also enabled specialist lung muscle tests to be carried out for the first time ever at Salisbury.

Lead respiratory and sleep physiologist Punam Korat said: "If this machine had not been funded by the Stars Appeal we wouldn't have been able to do the tests that our patients need and they would have to be sent to other hospitals like Southampton or Bournemouth. Our patients can now be seen quicker and we can do a specialist muscle functioning test where we test the respiratory muscles, which we were previously unable to do."

Kirsty Dudin, from Stratford-sub-Castle, is just one of the patients benefitting from the machine. The 76-year-old said: "I need regular testing for my lung disease so it makes a huge difference to be able to have these tests done locally. Driving to Southampton is possible for me still but when I become reliant on public transport it would be quite a journey to get there. Thanks to the Stars Appeal funding the new lung function machine here in Salisbury, getting to regular appointments is not difficult.

"It is great to have access to the very latest lung function testing equipment. I feel well cared for by the Respiratory Department who are able to monitor my condition so effectively with the new equipment. I feel very special and fortunate to be benefitting from the generosity of a lot of Salisbury citizens."

Francesca's story

Francesca Evans, a teacher from Wilton, explains how your support has helped her young family.

"I was seven months pregnant and busy getting ready to go back to school after half-term. I kept having pains. so I headed up to Salisbury Hospital. I was put on a monitor and then told 'your baby's coming'. I thought we've got ages yet, she can't be coming now!

What came next was such a blur. I had an emergency caesarean, and my baby daughter was born weighing just 3lbs. She was rushed away by the doctors to the Neonatal Unit.

I was very worried. I didn't know if I was going to be able to hold her or even touch her. I cried when I saw her for the first time. She looked so small and fragile in this huge incubator. We called her Margaux.

Knowing that she would be in hospital for a long time, I was frightened that I wouldn't be able to create the bond that I had with my son Rex.



Along with specialist equipment, the Stars Appeal provides special family rooms and 'mum and baby' rooms. They meant I could stay on the Neonatal Unit and be there all the time for Margaux, for every decision about her care and never miss anything. They gave us a home from home where we could be together as a family. Without that, I'd be going home a very broken lady every night.

Rex, who was only four, and my husband Tim would come and stay with us in the hospital. We were able to read bedtime stories together as a family around Margaux's incubator. And Rex loved the siblings' playroom!

Every week I looked forward to the visits from the Stars Appeal Live musicians. All you can normally hear is the beeping of the machines. It was wonderful and uplifting to hear music.

The accommodation and support provided by the Stars Appeal give you a solid foundation to becoming a parent because you can be with your baby from day one. I wouldn't have had that bond with Margaux if I wasn't able to stay with her. I didn't want her to ever

My family and I can't thank the Neonatal Unit and the Stars Appeal enough. They made what could have been a daunting, scary and life-changing experience so positive. By supporting the Stars Appeal, you are giving hundreds of families like mine the best start to life. Without the things the Stars Appeal provided during our month on the Neonatal Unit, we wouldn't have such a strong bond as we started life as a family of four. Thank you all so much!"

Support like yours helps us equip our Neonatal Unit with the latest incubators and technology. It also helps us fund parents' accommodation and makes us one of the few Neonatal Units in the UK able to offer every mum with a baby on the Unit a room of their own.

Olivia also spent time with nine-year-old Lily-Eva Cole, who was undergoing treatment for kidney cancer. Lily-Eva said: "I loved meeting Olivia Colman. She was fun and playful. She played with me on the play deck and told me a story about buttered bread with hundreds and thousands on top. My doctor, Row, opened the play deck for us so I felt like a VIP."

Mark Houghton MBE, 58, who was being cared for on the Spinal Unit after an accident, met Olivia during his physiotherapy session. He said: "It was quite emotional as it was only the second time I've been able to stand since my accident so it was really exciting that Olivia was able to see that. I've watched all the series of The Crown, it was truly amazing to meet her. I'll remember all the laughing and jokes."

Fellow Spinal Unit patient Sue Newman, 79, said meeting the actress was a "really uplifting experience" and added: "To see her in the flesh was delightful, she was so very friendly. Life on the Spinal Unit can be really challenging and rewarding. To have a visit from someone like Olivia really lifts your spirits. We were all so delighted to meet her."

Olivia, who previously visited the hospital in 2020, was joined by our president the Earl of Pembroke, and Lady Pembroke.

Helping families at the most difficult of times

Throughout the past year, the special sleeper chairs funded by your donations have enabled vulnerable patients and those at the end of their lives to have someone close stay by their side when it matters most.

We now have 36 sleeper chairs available to wards across the hospital. These special chairs easily convert from an armchair into a comfortable bed. Previously, relatives could only be offered upright or partially reclining chairs, which were uncomfortable and difficult to sleep on.

Lead End of Life Care Nurse and Stars Appeal Ambassador Paula Dawson said: "Every week I see firsthand how these chairs are bringing comfort to so many families. We thank all the Stars Appeal supporters who have helped fund them. Your generosity is helping patients and their families be together during the most difficult of times."

The sleeper chairs, which cost just over £50,000 in total, are making a difference for people like Gill Wade, who has kindly shared her story.

Gill's story

"My name is Gill Wade and I live in Salisbury.
This is me and my husband Colin. We were married for 56 years.

Colin had been ill for some time and earlier this summer he developed pneumonia and was taken into the hospital.

In the last week of my dear Colin's life, I stayed there with him all day and all night. The sleeper chair that support like yours funded made my stay in hospital so much more comfortable. It meant the world to Colin that I could be with him.

The last conversation I had with him, he got his hand out from the bed sheets and made a heart sign.

I promised Colin I would not leave his side. Having somewhere to sleep enabled me to fulfil my promise to him. He was able to go to sleep holding my hand, knowing I was there with him, right to the end.

I want to thank everyone that donates to the Stars Appeal for your support and to let you know how much difference you are making to local people like me and Colin. Thank you all so much."

Keyhole surgery up by 30% thanks to £500,000 of Stars Appeal funding

Generous gifts left by local people in their Wills, along with your donations and fundraising, have transformed care for thousands of patients undergoing surgery at Salisbury Hospital.

Over the last year, 30 per cent more patients have benefitted from keyhole surgery operations, waiting times have been reduced, and people are spending less time in hospital, following a £500,000 investment in new surgery facilities by the Stars Appeal.

In 2024, support like yours funded keyhole surgery equipment, enabling four additional operating theatres to perform this type of surgery. We also



enhanced the Day Surgery Unit with the creation of a new recovery lounge, consulting rooms, and a refurbished waiting area.

The surgical equipment is making a real difference for patients and allows surgeons to perform complex cancer operations, including bowel, ovarian, and uterine procedures, as well as routine surgeries such as gallbladder removal.

Head of Theatres, Matron Alex Hurley said: "The surgery equipment and recovery lounge are helping us deliver more operations. Nearly 1,000 extra patients each year can now have keyhole surgery, and the vast majority will go home that same day and have a better recovery.

"The Day Surgery Unit is now bright, airy, and calm, which is hugely important for patients who can often be feeling worried or scared. The new recovery lounge means we can make beds available sooner enabling us to treat all our patients more quickly.

"We want to give every single patient the best care we can and thanks to so many generous Stars Appeal supporters we can do just that."

Meet Emma, just one local person your donations are helping

"My name is Emma Beardsley. I'm 48 and live in Amesbury. In November 2023 my life changed in a second. Whilst doing my regular checks I found a lump.

My GP sent me to the Stars Appeal Breast Unit.

I thought it was just routine, nothing to worry about.

Walking into the unit doesn't feel like a hospital at all.

It's such a fantastic, friendly, and welcoming place.

I had a mammogram, then an ultrasound. They seemed to be doing a lot of measurements and checks. I thought something's not quite right here.

I had biopsies taken and was asked to wait to see the consultant.

I got called in and sat on the couch. The consultant said she was concerned it was breast cancer. As I walked to the car I thought how am I going to tell my parents, my son and my sister? I was in a state of shock.

The biopsy results confirmed it was breast cancer. I had my first operation at the end of November to remove the lump, and another surgery in January 2024. That period was a whirlwind.

In February I met my oncologist to find out what was next. That appointment was the hardest. I was told I would need seven rounds of chemotherapy, 10 sessions of radiotherapy and 18 rounds of antibody treatment. It was difficult to process all the information; it was so overwhelming. I thought how am I going to do this?

I started chemotherapy. I didn't know what to expect but the nurses on the Pembroke Suite made a really horrible experience so much better.

The Stars Appeal do so much to help patients on the Pembroke Suite. They provide extra equipment, comfy recliner chairs, and even snacks and biscuits and hot and cold drinks. The charity's free Wi-Fi was an absolute bonus. I could FaceTime my sister for a quick chat, which helped take my mind off my treatment.

During my chemotherapy I met the brilliant Shelley, the Stars Appeal Aromatherapist. She noticed that I was crying and asked if I was ok and offered me a foot massage. That day I felt at my lowest point, but Shelley was very kind, and the massage was so calming. It made me focus on the smells of the aromatherapy oils and forget where I was.

All these things took the stress out of being in hospital and I've now finished my treatment, returned to work full-time as a civil servant and I'm feeling good.

The Breast Unit, Pembroke Suite, Oncology Department and the Stars Appeal got me through last year. The extras provided by the Stars Appeal are incredible and helped me to keep being me. Thank you to everyone who supports the charity!"
